PLAGARISM POLICY



PURPOSE

To outline to our school community Glen Waverley Secondary College's policy requirements relating to plagiarism.

SCOPE

This policy applies to students in all year levels and staff for setting and monitoring student assessment. This policy should be read in conjunction with the VCAA Assessment Policy in the VCAA Handbook.

RATIONALE

Glen Waverley Secondary College is committed to creating and sustaining a learning community where everyone continually learns and grows. To that end, we expect our students to take responsibility for their learning and progress. It is important to develop honest and ethical lifelong learning practices.

Plagiarism

At GWSC, students are expected to submit their own work.

'Plagiarism is a type of misconduct that, in some cases, may also give rise to copyright infringement. Plagiarism occurs where a student uses someone else's ideas, images or words in their work and pretends they are their own. If the student has used a lot of someone else's words without that person's permission, copyright infringement may also occur'.

What is Plagiarism?

Plagiarism is considered to be intellectual theft. In the adult world there are serious legal consequences for this behaviour. At a school level, it is a form of cheating. Both GWSC and VCAA have strict guidelines about the penalties that will be incurred when students are deemed to be cheating.

Having a clear understanding of referencing conventions. another source. Summarising somebody else's work without Developing efficient and effective note taking strategies. acknowledgement of the source. Making sure you are organised with good time Submitting a group assignment or another students' management skills in order to have enough time for work as your own. referencing and proof reading. Sharing information on a test, homework, project or Ensure you understand the task, by clarifying exactly other assessment pieces. what is required with your teacher and how to Passing on or receiving test answers. appropriately research your response. Let someone else complete the work for you. Knowingly allow others to copy your work.

Expectations of Parents and Guardians

- Support and reinforce the GWSC Plagiarism policy.
- Support their child without completing the work for them.

Consequences Years 7-10

Each case of plagiarism will be assessed on an individual basis.

Consequences VCE

- The SAC/SAT will not be assessed.
- The student will be given a zero grade for the SAC/SAT (both Unit 1/2 and 3/4). The student will run the risk of
 receiving an N for the VCE Unit unless they are able to demonstrate achievement of the outcome by other means of
 assessment.
- Students who plagiarise a SAC/SAT, once given a zero grade, will not be given an opportunity to redeem their SAC/SAT performance.
- Those students found to be plagiarising a SAC in an accelerated subject will need to meet with a member of the college leadership team to determine eligibility to continue in accelerated studies.
